A NEW BEGINNING: THE COMMUNITY OF IPF PRIESTS

On August 22nd and 23rd boxes were unloaded and carried into a house on Webster Street near St. Cecilia's Cathedral in Omaha. What looked like an ordinary move to the casual outside observer was actually the beginning of a new chapter in IPF history. On those days, Fr. Richard Gabuzda and Fr. James Rafferty officially began life in the Community of IPF Priests, the fruit of many months of prayer, conversation and discernment.

A series of staff meetings, advisory council meetings and multiple conversations with Archbishop George Lucas of Omaha occurred throughout fall of 2012. Each step in the discernment process confirmed: priests were being raised up who had sensed a "call within a call" to remain diocesan priests while committing themselves to working more closely with the mission of the Institute for Priestly Formation. The consistent perception was to move forward now with the formation of a community of priests dedicated to IPF's mission.

The plan that developed identified two scenarios: some priests would form a residential community in Omaha while others would remain in their dioceses while yet being committed to IPF programs for set periods of time throughout the year. Both would be characterized by a discerned "call within a call" to remain diocesan priests while serving in the mission of IPF. The initial step focused on the residential community.

The Archbishop of Omaha authorized the formation of the community on a "provisional" basis, that is, to begin and then to see over a period of time whether the Holy Spirit confirms this initiative

by sending more priests as members. Father Gabuzda was appointed moderator of the new community.

the Summer Program for Seminarians for 11 years and who serves as Assistant Moderator of the Public Association formed from the Institute, petitioned his bishop, Bishop Joseph Bambera of the Diocese of Scranton, to become part of this provisional community. Fr. Rafferty received permission to be part of this provisional community in Omaha for a period of discernment, effective July 1st. Fr. Rafferty now serves the mission of IPF on the full-time staff as Director of Programs and Mission, providing general oversight of IPF programs and assuring the continuity and organic growth of the mission.

The Community members work day-by-day with the others on the IPF staff who represent many different calls to holiness. At the same time, the presence of the Community's priests greatly strengthens the staff, increases stability and allows for further growth.

Associate members, alumni, friends and benefactors are invited to join in prayer that, if it is his will, the Lord will send many additional priests to join this new community.





MANY FIND HOPE IN OMAHA THIS SUMMER

On July 10th and 11th, the Institute hosted 44 new friends from around the country in addition to others from Omaha for an event entitled, "A Reason for Your Hope" with special guest, His Eminence Daniel Cardinal DiNardo, Archbishop of Galveston-Houston. The gathering helped more people become familiar with the Institute's mission, especially its Summer Program for Seminarians.

Guests joined the seminarian community for Evening Prayer and Eucharistic Adoration. The evening continued at Physicians Mutual Insurance Company, adjacent to campus, with a splendid evening meal hosted by local supporters, Bob and Betsy Reed. Guests were presented with a brief history of how and why IPF was created followed by a powerful testimony from alumnus, Fr.

The next morning, attendees received a more formal presentation on the Institute's mission, including the "What is IPF?" video and testimonies from a current summer seminarian and a summer staff member. They once again joined the IPF community, this time for Mass celebrated by Cardinal DiNardo. At the luncheon that followed, local friends joined the group and were treated to "A Conversation with Cardinal DiNardo." The Cardinal offered reflections


on various subjects in response to questions posed by Father Gabuzda, who moderated the session.

Is there a special priest in your life you would like to honor?





When it was announced that their pastor, Fr. Harry Buse, was to be reassigned, Herm and Ellen Weist of Omaha thought the IPF *Pope John Paul II Fund for Priests* was the perfect way to thank Father Harry for his many years of dedicated service to St. Leo the Great Parish. "We were thrilled when several fellow parishioners and friends felt the same way and generously contributed to the Institute," Ellen said.

Another group led an effort to honor their pastor on his 25th anniversary of ordination. Still another went together to create an account for a recently deceased priest who had generously ministered to their parish. These are a few recent examples of how groups of laity have honored their beloved priests by opening accounts within the *Pope John Paul II Fund for Priests*. All three of these accounts have exceeded the \$5,000 threshold which means the accounts have become Perpetual and the name of the priest is inscribed on the beautiful Pope John Paul II Plaque currently displayed at

the Institute. The proceeds in all of the Fund's accounts are used by the Institute to train the next generation of priests.

An account can be opened for any priest whether he is a diocesan or religious priest, living or deceased. A brief biography of the honored priest and a list of all donors to his account are perpetually inscribed in the Book of Remem-



brance. When the Institute's new Center for Priestly Spirituality is constructed, there will be a prominent place for the Plaque and the Book of Remembrance.

Every summer, a Mass is celebrated in remembrance of all honored priests and their donors.

To date 57 priests have been honored by 297 donations. There is no limit as to how much money can go into an account. Donors can contribute to an existing account or open a new one.

By contributing to an account in honor of a priest, you can be part of the Mission of the Institute in the spiritual formation of seminarians and priests while at the same time recognizing the service and generosity of the priest of your choice. SPIRITUAL DIRECTION TRAINING PROGRAM EXPANDS

Since 2002, IPF has provided spiritual direction training for diocesan priests from throughout the United States. Over 340 participants from 40 dioceses have enjoyed this three year opportunity to grow in the art of spiritual direction, presented with the concrete realities of diocesan priestly ministry in mind.

Originally begun as a one-year pilot program in Florida, the program moved to the Conference Center at Mundelein Seminary, Chicago. The Conference Center and seminary have been gracious hosts ever since, enabling the program to grow and flourish. Numbers increased steadily since the first group graduated in 2005. As the program continued, one series was conducted in two venues: the Conference Center at Mundelein and a retreat house in the Diocese of Austin, Texas. The following series returned to Chicago in a greatly expanded version.

In recent years, as the class size rose to 77, demand far outstripped our ability

to provide for all those desiring to attend. The Institute entered into a process of discernment about how to respond to this increasing need. The discernment process identified the good that would come to both the Institute and participants if we were able to launch a second section of the program. However, the fact that Fr. John Horn, SJ, had not been replaced on the Institute's full-time staff precluded the possibility of moving in that direction.

With the arrival of Fr. Rafferty this past July, the situation changed dramatically. Details were gathered as the discernment continued and by the end of September, all the pieces fell into place and we were able to announce the cre-

ation of a second section of the program.

Both sections of the program will take place at the Conference Center of Mundelein Seminary. The sections will run in parallel with only a few weeks separating each of the sessions. The total enrollment of both sections combined is anticipated to be about 140, double the size of our previous programs!

As we celebrate this new milestone in IPF history, we gratefully acknowledge the generosity of the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the Archdiocese of Denver and the continuing generosity of the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary Conference Center whose support help this new venture possible.

FAVORABLE IRA TAX PROVISION FOR 2013

The American Taxpayer Relief Act, enacted on January 2, 2013, extended the favorable tax provisions which allow direct distributions from Individual Retirement Accounts to charities.

A person who is 70 ½ or older can make qualified charitable distributions directly from an IRA up to an aggregate of \$100,000 for 2013. One of the main benefits of the charitable distribution rule is that direct payments to the charities by the IRA can satisfy some or all of the minimum distribution requirements for those over 70 ½ and thus shelter that income from taxation. This provision expires at the end of 2013.



For tax purposes, it is important the funds be payable directly from the IRA account to the charity. Some financial institutions require that they mail the check directly to the charity; others will make the check payable to the charity, but mail the check to the owner of the IRA so the owner can mail or present the check to the charity. Since this favorable tax provision expires at the end of the year, it is important these donations be accomplished in 2013.

The idea of Spiritual Motherhood has expanded and now includes "cells" of praying moms outside of Omaha.

An initiative several years ago to begin Spiritual Fathers, men who pray for the summer faculty and staff, continues to enhance the "dome of grace" each year. That "dome of grace" provided by the prayers of Spiritual Moms and Dads was mentioned by staff members this summer as being present and tangible throughout the entire ten week program. Surely the Holy Spirit is encouraging the IPF programs to be surrounded with prayer for all participants during their summer in Omaha.

SPIRITUALITY AS THE CORRECT METHOD FOR THEOLOGICAL STUDY

Each year IPF conducts a research seminar on some aspect of priestly formation. On September 13th - 16th, ten theologians from around the world participated in a Seminar on the theme of "Spirituality: the Correct Method for Doing Theological Study." This theme was inspired by the thoughts of Pope Benedict XVI, particularly his comments delivered at a Congress devoted to the work of the late Hans Urs Von Balthasar in 2005. This Swiss theologian dedicated a good part of his research to restoring a unity between the study of theology and the call of Christ for theologians to become holy. Pope Benedict himself has noted that theology needs faith; theology needs its practitioners to think in faith since it is faith that frees reason to think more effectively and to see its object more clearly.

The papers presented in this seminar will culminate in

a book to be published by IPF Publications. It will be intended for use by seminary formators nationally and internationally. The days of study were enveloped in prayer, silence and fraternity. These days were also ones of deep conversation among the theologians as participants, in humility, helped one another bring clarity to each other's ideas.




