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

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR:



Dear Friends,

Once again we were blessed with many graces throughout this past summer. We welcomed 177 seminarians for our nine-week program. They came from 65 different dioceses, including the Archdiocese of Vancouver and the Diocese of Kamloops, Canada. Seven seminary spiritual directors participated in our three-week seminar; the Spiritual Exercises program hosted six priests and eleven seminarians. The faculty retreat welcomed 7 participants. And this summer we piloted a new program, an advanced seminar for seminary spiritual directors; six priests joined us for that program.

Throughout these months we have been delighted that new friends have chosen to support us in a variety of ways, especially through the St. John Paul II Fund for Priests. We have continued to travel to various parts of the country to continue to spread the word about the Institute's mission.

Next year will mark the Institute's 25th Anniversary. We look forward to celebrating this milestone in a variety of

ways throughout the year. However, we are planning a gala celebration in Omaha next July 12-14. We hope that alumni and friends from across the country will join us, alongside our good friends here in Omaha.

We also look forward to co-hosting with St. Vincent De Paul Regional Seminary a symposium for seminary formators which will feature as keynote speaker Archbishop Jorge Patrón Wong, Secretary for Seminaries at the Congregation for the Clergy. The symposium will invite prayer and reflection on an important and visionary document on priestly formation which the Congregation published two years ago, *The Gift of the Priesthood (Ratio Fundamentalis)*.

For all that the Lord has done in recent months and for all that He is bringing about in the coming months and throughout next year, we give thanks. We remain grateful for our many alumni and friends who continue to support the Institute's mission by their prayer and financial sacrifices.

PRE-ORDINATION RETREATS

Beginning in April 2019, IPF will host a silent directed retreat specifically for those men who are soon to be ordained deacons or priests. Church law instructs those preparing for ordination to spend at least five days in retreat to prepare their hearts with the Lord to enter into the gift and mystery of Holy Orders. Over the past several years, seminarians have contacted IPF to arrange for a silent directed retreat as the way in which they have wanted

to be with the Lord in the important time before ordination. Having daily spiritual direction has helped their time of prayer to be fruitful. While many of those seminarians have been able to arrange an individually directed retreat with a spiritual director whenever it has been convenient for both the seminarian and the director, this year IPF will offer the first organized retreat that can serve a larger number of seminarians as a group. IPF is

committed to serving the spiritual lives of priests and seminarians, and the period leading up to ordination is a crucial time for listening to the Lord and receiving His friendship in a way that often gives new strength and confidence to a man's vocation as he offers himself to God and the Church for life. JOINED IN SORROW, PRAYING IN FAITH

We would be remiss if in this issue of our newsletter we did not mention the painful situation taking place in the Catholic Church at this time. In the United States, revelations of horrific instances of abuse perpetrated by Catholic priests, coupled with long-standing immoral behavior on the part of a highly influential cardinal, elicit anger, pain and grief on the part of all Catholics. We at the Institute share in the sorrow for all who have been harmed by the infidelity of priests, especially minors, and we are united in intercession for comfort and healing for all of them.

These deeply felt emotions have resulted in calls for a system of greater accountability for bishops and a means of overseeing and disciplining bishops who are at fault. Bishops and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops have acknowledged the gravity of the situation and have offered suggestions for initial courses of action. Pope Francis has called for a meeting of the presidents of bishops conferences from throughout the world to address the crisis. In addition, as seminaries themselves have come under scrutiny and concerns have been expressed for the safety of seminarians, some seminaries have designated outside resources for reporting instances of harassment.

While courses of action can and must be developed, we know that the Church must also continue to call for greater holiness on the part of priests. The life of "interiority," a deep prayer life, a life of union with God which carries into daily life, certainly lies at the heart of any Church reform. Now more than ever, the Church is in need of saints, and, in particular, priests who are saints.

The Institute for Priestly Formation remains committed to our mission which focuses on "the cultivation of a deep interior communion with Christ" which leads the priest to share in Christ's own pastoral charity. As we too grieve and join the whole Church in prayer, we pray that we ourselves may be renewed in the mission to which we have been called. We once again place ourselves at the service of the Church, as an instrument in God's hands for helping priests, seminarians and those who form them to strengthen and deepen this vocation which is so essential to the mission of the Church.

We invite all of our alumni, friends and benefactors to recall that, at times of greatest darkness in the Church's history, saints have been raised up. And Jesus has promised that the darkness will not overcome the power of His Cross and that He will continue to care for the Church which is His Body.

Nearly 30 teachers come to Omaha to help instruct these men throughout the summer, helping IPF to provide smaller class sizes and a more one-on-one learning environment.

Seventeen priests and seminarians made a thirty day silent retreat at IPF this past summer on the campus of Creighton University. They walked in the footsteps of countless others before them following "The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Loyola." They came from Chicago, Cleveland, Portland, Orlando, San Jose, Washington, Canada and Malta. How could they be silent for so long?

On the outside, it looks like they just exert will power not to speak for 30 days, but that misses the profound gift of what is happening in their hearts. What do they do?

Each day the retreatant prays four or five one-hour periods of quiet prayer.

They meet with a spiritual director daily to receive suggestions for prayer in a way that is unique to them and their personal relationship with God—similar to how a personal trainer designs an of their identity as beloved sons of the Father. From this foundation, they are strengthened in their priesthood. We are very grateful for your support that allows these priests to grow in deeper union with God so, in turn, we can be drawn closer to God and one another.

exercise program for an individual. Each hour they pray for a specific grace, pray with a Scripture passage or meditation, and they speak personally to the Father, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, the Blessed Mother, and perhaps St. Joseph or another saint as they are drawn. As they pray through the life of Jesus Christ, they are invited through the meditations to be in closer friendship with Him and to remain with Him always. They do this as they share with Him the joys, hurts, struggles and deep desires of their hearts. These deep personal places are brought forth to experience His love, His mercy, His healing and the fullness of their identity as beloved sons of the Father. From this foundation, they are strengthened in their priesthood. We are very grateful for your support that allows these priests to grow in deeper drawn closer to God and one another.





GROWING THE FOUNDATION

Most good stories have a solid beginning. For the past several years, P. Thomas Pogge, Executive Director of The Institute for Priestly Formation Foundation, and Larry Dwyer, President of the Foundation, have been working to establish a solid Foundation for IPF.


The structure includes an expanded Board of Directors, and creation of several Committees consisting of Major Gifts, Planned Giving, Investment and Finance, and Grants. The Investment and Finance Committee has developed a Statement of Investment Policy to guide both the long-term and short-term investment of the funds in the Foundation.

The Foundation has investments with The Catholic Community Foundation for Eastern South Dakota and Merrill Lynch Bank of America. Both entities follow the Catholic Screening Guidelines of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Currently, the Foundation has assets of approximately \$1,960,000. This provides a good start to its efforts of expanding the assets.

A number of documents have been prepared to assist in solicitations of Major Gifts and Planned Giving. Of significance is the creation of the Sacred Heart of Jesus Legacy Society to honor major donors and those who make provision in their estates in support of the mission of the Institute. A number of alumni and other donors have included the Institute in their estates.

With IPF's 25th Anniversary fast approaching in 2019, we have asked our Board and Committee members to help us make this Silver Anniversary a significant building block for the next 25 years.



SPIRITUAL MOMS: 11 YEARS OF PRAYER

"But can we do it? Can we have every seminarian covered by the time they arrive?"

These were the questions posed by Anne Pogge at a ladies' luncheon in early May 2008. Anne had gathered women close to the Institute for a luncheon in her home to celebrate IPF recently becoming a Public Association of the Faithful. Only a few days prior to the luncheon, Anne had envisioned what was to become the IPF Spiritual Moms initiative, an initiative which celebrated its 11th summer this year. Her prayer was that every seminarian headed to Omaha to participate in IPF's spiritual formation program that summer of 2008 would be prayed for, by name, by a specific woman in the Omaha area, creating a prayerful "dome of grace" for the program participants. The ten ladies present at the luncheon got to work. They made phone calls, they sent emails, they prayed for inspiration as to whom to contact – and they did it. Every one of the 150 men that year had a Spiritual Mom – and every seminarian since then has also had, not only one, but many women praying for him during his time in Omaha.

Anne's coordination of the program for the past eleven years has been a gift to IPF. The hours and hours of phone calls, emails, and hours spent pouring over spreadsheets making sure every seminarian not only had women

praying for him, but that there was a woman there to share "Friends Night" with him, has truly been a spiritual work of mercy. And the graces have flowed, not only for the seminarians, but for their "moms" as well.

IPF wishes to thank Anne for her dedicated service to this beautiful apostolate and for posing the questions to the other faith filled women at her luncheon eleven summers ago.

THE BLESSING OF GOD'S PROVIDENCE

A transcript of the witness given by Robert Kinyon at Friends Night 2018

This summer has been such a tremendous and a powerful blessing for me, from day one, up to today, when I get to talk to you and share just one of the graces. I really had no clue what I wanted to talk about. I wanted something that's very overarching, that hopefully I could apply within a couple different experiences that I've had. But, I think the major grace and the major blessing that I've come to receive from the Lord is an experiential understanding of the goodness of His providence, coming to actually know Him, coming to know His love for me, and to be able to trust in the plan that He has laid out for me.

I think the first experience of His goodness and of His providence is the fact that I'm here. I spent three months on the waiting list trying to get in. With each day that went by, I was actually more and more resolved not to come. I was kind of like, "Yeah, well, if I don't get in, no big deal. I'll find something else to do within the Diocese of Rapid City."

All of February passed, all of March, April and May and then three days before the program started, my vocations director received an email from Fr. Rich, saying, "We have a spot, he's in and he's ready to go!" Really? It totally floored me and in the hardness of my heart I was kind of like, "Dang it. Seriously?" I had a whole different agenda, a whole different plan to

spend time within my diocese, but sure enough I was in the car driving here, and I was a little sour about it.

But then going into the retreat and spending time with the Lord really blew me away. And, yeah, I came in like a total mess. It wasn't a coincidence that I didn't want to be here. I think the evil one was very present. I was very unsure and uncertain about my vocation. I'm going to Rome next year for seminary and I really wasn't especially excited about that. I felt like I hadn't really experienced the Lord and His powerful love in quite some time. All those things were powerfully resolved in my retreat. Jesus touched my heart in an incredibly powerful and reassuring and unbelievable way. It totally blew me away.

There was a certain peacefulness and ease going forward which assured me, thank God, and gave me confidence about my vocation. Receiving the call to the priesthood and then just being able to soak in the graces that have come since then over the past few weeks since the retreat has been an incredible blessing.

So, I just want to thank you, for all your prayers and for all your generosity. It's incredibly humbling for me to speak here in front of you knowing that your love and your prayers are being poured into all of our hearts and into the heart of the Father. Thank you.

VISITING THEOLOGIAN

Mary McCaughey, Professor of Theology at St Mary's College (Seminary), Oscott, England held the position of Visiting Theologian during the summer seminarian program. She presented a lecture to the faculty, and researched essays on priestly formation. Her work will be helpful to many in the seminary world as she furthers our understanding of Joseph Ratzinger's approach to the spiritual direction of priests. In addition Dr. McCaughey has authored a book on women and prayer which IPF Publications will produce next year.

PASTORAL FORMATION TO HEAL

In September seven seminary theologians met at the Institute for Priestly Formation on the Campus of Creighton University. The invited theologians came from various institutions in Detroit, St. Paul, Birmingham, England, Los Angeles, New Orleans, New York City, and Emmitsburg. The goal of the Seminar was to engage theologians in conversation and prayer about how priestly formation assists in the emotional and spiritual healing of seminarians. The popular and political culture is poisoning progression in affective maturity, limiting our recognition of truth, stunting our capacity to trust God and think of the needs of others. How can the four areas of formation be agents of healing to facilitate theology's capacity to heal the mind, pastoral formation's role to heal self-centeredness, human formation's role to free men from resisting selfknowledge, and spiritual formation's role to bring the truth about oneself into contemplative intimacy with God? The research conducted by the theologians will constitute the contents of an IPF Publications book

to appear in 2019, serving the ongoing formation needs of seminary faculty worldwide.

Overall, these Seminars fit into the other ministry for seminary theologians within the Institute, namely, our Annual Seminary Theologian Retreat, held each June on the campus of Creighton University.

The 2018 Seminar for Seminary Theologians participants include: Dr Anthony Lilles, Dr. Ralph Martin, Father Tommy Lane, Father Tom Berg, Dr. Daniel Burns, Father Paul Keane, and Dr. Deborah Savage.
