From the IPF Executive Director:

Dear Friends,

Speaking with priests from across the country recently, one alumnus mentioned that IPF helped fill a hunger in him to be in deeper relationship with God. As the new Executive Director I am glad to hear this - that IPF can serve the spiritual lives of priests. Even more deeply, this is a basic human hunger - to be in relationship with God.

Relationship is something I noticed I hungered for in the months of March and April and May when many events were cancelled, and travel curtailed due to Covid-19. In-person meetings gave way to video meetings, and large gatherings were postponed. I noticed my friends became more important to stay in contact with. My family became more important. Parishioners became more important. Jesus became more important. It was an unexpected grace, to again see the primacy of relationship.

The framework of Relationship, Identity, Mission is a spiritual grounding that is central to our existence at IPF. Relationship with God is primary, from which I understand who I am (my identity is rooted God) from there I see more clearly who I am asked to serve in my vocation (mission).

At our weekly IPF staff meetings in the Spring we gathered each week via video conference. A question arose as cancellations of some of our programs loomed - How does God want us to enter into this time? The cancellation of our summer programs this year left a big window of time on our hands at IPF. Collectively, it was a time of prayer, conversation, and asking God how might IPF best serve the Church in priestly formation going forward. It was a deliberate return to relationships; to our supporters, our friends, and God. In this issue, you will read about the fruits of the summer, new programs, and the stories of long-time friends who have gone to the Lord this year.

Finally, you will notice that we refreshed our normal newsletter to a magazine style for easier reading. Along with this is a refreshed logo, which you can read about on page 11. The title of the magazine, Hearts of Fire, comes from our tagline at IPF, "Hearts on Fire for Christ", which is our desired outcome for all involved with IPF.

Summer at IPF in 2020

The Fruits of a Summer: Growing in Relationship with God



Vision 2025

We want to make sure IPF continues to prepare priests to shepherd others to Christ in a renewal of holiness across the Church. Since January, we have been blessed with a strategic plan: "Vision 2025", which was the effort of two years of work with supporters and the staff of IPF. Check our website to see how we are planning for the next five years (priestlyformation.org).

Part of our "Vision 2025" strategic plan is to expand programs, and consult, especially, on how our summer seminarian program fits in the overall structure of priestly formation.



Summer Consultations

Due to Covid-19, we cancelled the summer seminarian program - the first time in 26 years we did not host the program. We used the extra time this summer for consultations, via video conference, on how IPF might better serve the "itinerary", or path, of priestly formation that the Church proposed in the 2016 document *The Gift of Priestly Formation*.

The summer program fills an important transition stage when a seminarian moves from the discipleship stage to the configuration to Christ stage.

One consultation, with long-time friends who are involved in priestly formation work, produced a proposal that IPF offer a symposium to help articulate the common spiritual thread found in *The Gift of Priestly Formation* — from the stage of initial discernment of a man entering the seminary through his ongoing formation as a priest. The consultation helped us see that the summer program fills an

important transition stage when a seminarian moves from the discipleship stage to the configuration to Christ stage. Another proposal was to serve the spiritual needs of priests in the 5-10 year-ordained cohort. *The Gift of Priestly Formation* denotes this as part of the ongoing formation stage of priesthood.

A second consultation with a group of bishops asked how IPF might best serve the spiritual lives of bishops. We propose to offer a program for bishops beginning in Fall 2021. There would be 2 modules each year; a module on teachings on the spiritual life, and then an 8-day silent directed retreat. Serving the spiritual lives of bishops has been on the heart of IPF since our founding.

Friends Night

Our annual "Friends Night" that occurs in the heart of the summer program usually brings together the seminarians, spiritual moms, and other friends of IPF on the campus of Creighton University. This was moved to a virtual format. It allowed for many of our friends from across the U.S to join us for Mass, Adoration and Benediction, and some time for reflection. We livestreamed the event from a local Omaha parish.



Spiritual Direction Training Program

A new cohort of the Spiritual Direction Training Program for priests was to begin in Spring 2020. We delayed the start of the cohort until Spring 2021. The program is on a three-year cycle, with three modules each year (Spring, Fall, Winter). The Fall module is a silent-directed retreat. We host the program at Mundelein Seminary, and look forward to starting next Spring, and have 151 participants enrolled.

IPF's Advent Morning of Reflection

What's Happening with the Event in December

December 12th has been set as the date for this year's Advent Morning of Reflection. Although the format will be somewhat modified, we will continue this tradition of gathering to pray in the midst of our Advent journey. We will have both an in-person gathering and will also welcome others through a live-stream connection.

For those able to join us in person, we will gather at 10 a.m. in St. Vincent de Paul Church, Omaha. We will begin with Mass, with Fr. Jim Rafferty as the main celebrant and homilist. Following Mass, IPF's new Executive Director, Fr. Brian Welter, will offer an Advent reflection. As usual, we will provide a special Advent image and suggestions for prayer.

Friends who cannot be with us in person are invited to join us via live-stream. Links will be available on the IPF website and IPF Facebook page.

Genuine Appreciation for Our Priests



This has been a year like no other in recent history. Through it all, our priests have been reminding us of God's unconditional love for each of us. They have been tackling technology to bring Mass into living rooms during the shutdown and braving infection as they share the sacraments with their parishioners.

These acts of accompanying us and assisting in deepening our relationship with God are not unique in these times, but they are balm to our souls.

Mass was celebrated by IPF priest leadership for all perpetual priests and their donors prior to the program.

Individuals, parishes, and other organizations have worked with the Institute to create an effort that funds their particular priest's account. Group efforts are easy.

People, this year especially, have genuinely appreciated being offered the opportunity to show their gratitude for their priest's vocation. Every contribution also supports the Institute's mission of working in collaboration with Catholic seminaries and dioceses to form bishops, priests, and seminarians in holiness and accompany them in their ongoing spiritual growth so they can more effectively lead others to Christ.

While donations help build a stronger Church, this gesture of honoring priests has a buoying effect on our priests today.

After a recent medallion presentation, the recipient priest said, "I do not need this medallion as a priest. And yet, receiving it has touched me in such a deep way. I think everyone appreciates being appreciated."

These retreat-like events give laity an important taste of the spirituality offered to the clergy who participate in IPF programs strengthening their personal relationship with God.

In recent months, Fr. Gabuzda has been spending a good amount of time helping to transition Fr. Welter into his new role. Fr. Welter has been well briefed on the strategic planning process conducted last year which has led to the creation of Vision 2025, a five-year plan for IPF's growth. Fr. Gabuzda has been helpful in providing background information about the extensive process that led to the Vision document.

As mentioned previously, the staff has been planning a new program for bishops. Fr. Gabuzda has been working on this project, including writing a grant to help start the program. In addition, he has also been working on grants for next summer's seminarian program.

In his spare time, with the help of Andrea from our office staff, he is going through 25 years' worth of files, creating a mainly electronic archive of saved files. Who knows, maybe the journey through old files will produce a chapter or two more of IPF history?

VISION 2025

Vision 2025, the fruit of a year long strategic planning process, provides the way forward for the next five years of the IPF mission. The Beliefs and Convictions, along with our Mission Statement, Vision Statement and Objectives (cf. page 2), will guide us in implementing the Vision.

Our Beliefs and Convictions

- 1. We believe all people can enter into a personal, intimate relationship with the Trinity.
- 2. We believe we are in a unique period in human and Church history in which the faithful are in need of more healthy and holy priests and bishops, who can only live in authentic holiness through prayer and deep, sustained spiritual relationship with the Trinity.
- 3. We believe in the importance of fidelity to the whole of Catholic teaching.
- 4. We believe priests are expected to be experts in the spiritual life and that through their ministry, the faithful can be assisted to draw closer to the living God.
- We believe every priest should always feel that he is a disciple on a journey, constantly needing an integrated formation, understood as a continuous configuration to Christ.
- 6. We believe priests who are in deep interior friendship with Christ more effectively live out pastoral charity through ministry to the People of God.
- 7. We believe that individual accompaniment is essential to the journey to growth in holiness.
- 8. We believe relationship with Jesus Christ is the integrating and unifying core of all aspects of priestly formation.
- 9. We believe priestly celibacy is a gift from Christ that, when lived as a way of love, is spiritual life-giving.
- 10. We believe the spiritual teachings of St. Ignatius Loyola can assist all men and women of faith to encounter Christ. We believe these spiritual gifts, while not exclusively so, are particularly well-suited for the spiritual formation of diocesan seminarians, priests, or those involved in priestly formation.
- 11. We believe Mary, Our Lady of Guadalupe, patroness of the Americas, is our "mother and fountain of life." We gratefully invoke her untiring intercession for our mission, together with Saint Joseph, "Father of the Interior Life."

IPF Priests of St. Joseph Continues to Grow

October 22, 2020 will mark the fifth anniversary of the granting of the statutes to the IPF Priests of St. Joseph. On that day five years ago, the feast of St. John Paul II, Archbishop Lucas officially granted recognition of the IPF Priests of St. Joseph as a Clerical Public Association.

The Association draws together diocesan priests who profess vows of chastity, poverty and obedience, as well as an additional vow to care for the spiritual life of fellow diocesan priests. The Association consists of internal and external members.

Internal members live in Omaha and work full time with the mission of IPF. At present, Fr. Rich Gabuzda and Fr. Jim Rafferty serve in that capacity. External members live in their own dioceses and assist with IPF programs as possible. As of this summer, there are five external members: Fr. Josh Brown. Diocese

of Grand Island; Fr. Nicholas Cachia, Archdiocese of Malta; Fr. Rob Cadrecha, Diocese of St. Petersburg; Fr. Jorge Garcia, Diocese of San Bernardino; Fr. Andrew Gehringer, Diocese of Allentown.


Fr. Jeff Eirvin, vocation director for the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, was accepted as a candidate this past May. Fr. Eirvin, who also serves as President of the National Conference of Diocesan Vocation Directors, will engage in a two-year formation program.

Usually, external members come to Omaha during our summer programs, providing the time when the Association celebrates the profession of or renewal of vows. Since this was not possible due to the cancellation of summer programs, we "met" this summer via Zoom and were able to share with each other that important time of prayer and conversation.

Here's a screen shot of the Zoom gathering, held on July 1, 2020. The gathering brought priests together from three time zones and six different states! During prayer, Fr. Cachia and Fr. Gehringer professed third temporary vows, Fr. Cadrecha professed second temporary vows, and Fr. Brown and Fr. Garcia professed first temporary vows. Kathy Kanavy joined the POSJ for the occasion as did Fr. Brian Welter.




2019 Revenues


Priest as Prophet: Priestly Participation in the Prophetic Ministry of Jesus


