

Tim and Lou are welcome additions to the IPF Foundation Board, and we are grateful for their service.




Advent Morning of Reflection Opportunities

Receiving God

Growing the Fruits of IPF's Summer Seminarian Program

I went to IPF this summer with a certain amount of trepidation. It had been two years since we last had the summer program, and Covid protocols and fears threatened to overshadow what I always remembered as a summer of freedom and peace. Furthermore, I did not know how the experience of 2020 would have affected the seminarians and me. Would the summer basically be just trying to "undo" the effects of that year? Would the fear, anxiety, anger, division, and distrust that was so rampant in our country be the common theme for the whole summer? I anticipated a heavy couple of months.

Oh me of little faith! Why did I doubt? When I arrived in Omaha, the men had just finished their first week of class in preparation for their 8-day silent retreat. And already there was a spirit of joy and freedom in many of their faces. Simply by hearing the truth of the Gospel spoken into the lies in their hearts, they were experiencing the new life of Christ and the freedom of the Holy Spirit. It was like seeing sons who knew the goodness of their Father. There was trust, hope, love, and joy. There had never been any reason for me to fear.

It is tempting to imagine that we will have to do so much work to undo the effects of 2020's turmoil. And, as always, IPF confronted that temptation in pure Marian fashion: "the most fruitful activity of the human person is to be able to receive God." This summer was not a summer of trying to fix problems. It was a summer of receiving God's love into our hearts. Naturally, that fixed a lot of problems. But that was not the goal; it was the necessary fruit of divine intimacy. We do not have to do much to heal from 2020's barrage of hardships. No, like Mary, we have to receive God into our lives, messy and broken as they are.

Sometimes I wonder how the culture will heal from the last few years. This summer provided the answer for me. As these seminarians experienced the power of Christ in their lives, they in turn go out and direct others to receive Him. In the midst of a world overshadowed by darkness and sin, I cannot help but see the dawn of a new springtime arising before our eyes

Remembering Fr. Nicholas Cachia

November 22, 1961 – July 28, 2021

With both grief and hope we mark the passing into eternal life of a dear friend, fellow staff member, and member of the IPF Priests of St. Joseph. Fr. Cachia went to the house of the Father following a three-year battle with cancer.

Fr. Cachia first discovered IPF through our website. As a priest of the Archdiocese of Malta (an island nation off the coast of Italy), he was searching for a program to enrich his work as a seminary spiritual director in the Archdiocesan seminary. He signed up for IPF's Seminar for Seminary Spiritual Directors and the Spiritual Exercises program during the 2003 summer session. From that first association with IPF, Fr. Cachia became an instructor in the IPF 504 summer course and, in recent years, also served as a spiritual director for the Spiritual Exercises program, while serving at St. Vincent De Paul Seminary in Florida.

Always mindful of his home diocese and its needs, he contributed his program stipends to a fund that allowed several Maltese seminarians to attend IPF's summer programs.

Fr. Cachia was accepted as an IPF Priest of St. Joseph in 2016 and professed his fourth temporary vows with the Association two weeks before his death. Throughout the three years of his battle with cancer, he often repeated his intention of offering his sufferings for the good of priests and, especially, for the IPF Priests of St. Joseph.

We are confident that he continues to intercede for us all, now doing so in the company of St. Joseph.


Even from before the launching of the seminarian program in 1995, Dr. Schlientz was "all in." Always

Being Formed by the Heart of the Father: Saint Matthew Speaks to Seminarians



40 Years of Priesthood

Fr. Rich Gabuzda Celebrated His Ordination on Sept. 27th

September 27th marked the 40th anniversary of Fr. Rich Gabuzda's ordination to the priesthood. Ordained in the diocese of Scranton, PA, and in his home parish on this day in 1981, he celebrated his First Mass in that same Church on the following day. Kathy Kanavy directed the music at both the ordination and First Mass.

Fr. Rich's first assignment was to St. Boniface parish in Williamsport, PA, where he served for three years before being sent to Rome for further studies. After his studies, he was assigned to St. Pius X Seminary, a college seminary in the Diocese of Scranton, which was affiliated with the University of Scranton. While at the seminary, he served in various capacities: theology instructor, academic dean, director of music and formation advisor. During that time, he met Fr. John Horn, S.J., who served as adjunct spiritual director at the seminary. One of the seminarians he taught was Mr. James Rafferty!

While on the seminary faculty, in the summer of 1992, Fr. Rich made a 30-day retreat in Omaha together with Kathy Kanavy, under the direction of Fr. Horn. From that experience and together with the help of Fr. George Aschenbrenner, S.J., the elements of what would become the Institute for Priestly Formation were brought together. Fr. Rich became its Executive Director, the position he held for over 25 years.



Much fruit has been born through IPF from Fr. Rich's saying "yes" to God — from the time of ordination to the present. On behalf of Fr. Rich, we believe a quote from Psalm 40 is appropriate: "You, yes you O Lord, my God have done many wonderous deeds! And in your plans for us there is none equal to you. Should I wish to declare or tell them, too many are they to recount!" We look forward to recounting them with you Fr. Rich. Happy Anniversary!

A Positive and Stable Masculine Identity: Directions in the Formation of Seminarians



The general understanding of what it means to be male and female is in flux in both academia and in contemporary Western culture. If seminary formators want candidates for the priesthood to have a "positive and stable sense" of their own "masculine identity," they have work to do in interpreting what genuine masculinity is and then applying that interpretation to clerical formation. Any sound interpretation of masculinity will include an understanding of it as both a gift and a task. It is a gift of being an embodied person in communion with others, but it also is a task to love appropriately in the context of these roles. The goal of this book is to facilitate a conversation among seminary staff on the true nature of a masculine priest.

IPF's Spiritual Direction Training Program


Extending Silence to Deepen the Encounter with Christ

The fall session of the Spiritual Direction Training Program invited the priest participants to enter an Ignatian-style retreat. At the spring sessions, which were held in April and May at the University of Saint Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary, Kathy Kanavy encouraged the priests to extend the built in 5-day retreat, making it a full 8-day silent retreat. In past sessions, around one-third of the men (around 60 priests) extended their retreat allowing them to stay in

the silence with the Lord a little longer. The staff was thrilled when more than two-thirds of the men (around 100 priests) in the current sessions signed up for retreat extensions. This boost in the desire for staying in the silence is such a beautiful testimony that these men are making great sacrifices to fill themselves up in order to return to their flocks more spiritually refreshed. Please pray for these 154 priests as they continue in this three-year program.

The Discerning Priest: Ignatian Wisdom for Daily Life in Priesthood


