From the IPF Executive Director:

Dear Friends,

We are coming off a great summer at IPF with another group of seminarians completing the Summer Program for Seminarians, hosted at Creighton University. For me, the highlight is to see and hear the transformation that takes place in the seminarians over the nine weeks we are together for the program.

What I "see" is the seminarians' commitment to prayer, to detaching from noise and social media, and engaging each other in sports, friendships, and serving the poor. I see them spending time studying, paying attention to their neighbor (literally and figuratively), and helping those who need assistance — the many basketball games each year always yield a seminarian who needs "help" after he sprains an ankle! While this may sound trivial, they are paying attention to people around them. I am always delighted to see the seminarians take time to talk with the dining hall workers, other service staff at the University, and visiting people in local assisted living facilities.

What I "hear" from them is the impact of the time spent in silent prayer, especially the 8-day silent, directed retreat. Prayer becomes less abstract and much more personal. The seminarians meet Jesus, His Father, and the Blessed Mother in the concrete circumstances of their lives. God is relational, not distant, and the seminarians speak of it. At our annual "Friends Night," the seminarians gather to meet the women, "Spiritual Moms", who are praying for them. At this gathering, two seminarians shared their testimonies with a crowd of nearly 300 people on the impact of the summer and the deepening of their relationship with God. I hear seminarians share that their hearts are inflamed with a desire to know God, for priesthood and for evangelization—making known the truths and beauty of the Faith to others because they have encountered the living God.

This all reminds me of the timeless Scripture passage that we hear after Christmas from the beginning of the First Letter of John: "What was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we looked upon and touched with our hands concerns the Word of Life." It is a great gift to see and hear the encounters that the seminarians have with Jesus Christ in their own words and actions.

There is great hope in the next generation of Catholic priests.

Living Stones Campaign Update

Continued Gifts Allow IPF Building to Flourish



We are approaching the year anniversary when IPF discovered its new headquarters. We searched for over a year for new office space, and at times the search became discouraging. Fr. Rich Gabuzda would always remain positive and remind us that we needed to ask the Holy Spirit to guide us. He would encourage us to say, "Come, Holy Spirit!" That simple, yet powerful prayer was a good reminder to ask for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in all that we do. So often, we get caught in the trap of thinking we are in charge of making things happen, forgetting we are here to do God's Will. Only when we trust in Him will we be able to take the next step and move forward.

It has been a rewarding journey to find the new headquarters for IPF's operations. We have been guided by the power of the Holy Spirit every step of the way. To recap, last year, during the week of Thanksgiving, we found and secured the building with the help of a building committee. We began our Capital Campaign with a successful silent phase. This allowed us to put a significant down payment on the building and begin renovation. We are so grateful for

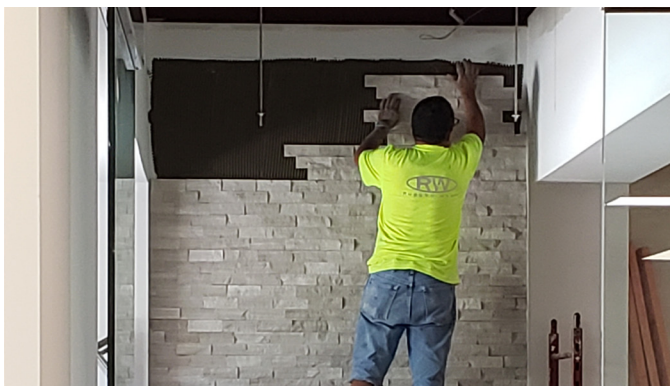
all who have contributed to the second phase of the campaign. Of the funds needed, 75 percent has been donated. So many of our supporters have been walking on this journey with us by offering their prayers, expertise, donations, and encouragement.

We recently applied for and received a grant from a family foundation that wishes to remain anonymous. This grant will allow IPF to construct and furnish a small chapel within the IPF headquarters. This beautiful gift will allow us to have daily Mass and invite others to attend small events within the building. **We are deeply grateful.**

Recently, the **IPF Foundation Board approved funds in cooperation with an anonymous donor** to provide an additional generous gift. **A \$500,000 Match** is being offered as an incentive to raise the remaining funds needed for the Living Stones Capital Campaign. Your contribution will count double if we can meet the Match. This will allow us to retire the remaining mortgage, purchase new technology infrastructure and equipment, and establish a building maintenance fund.

Here is how you can help: Dollars donated or pledged between now and Nov. 30, 2022, will be matched up to \$500,000. Your donations will **effectively be doubled** through the generosity of the matched funds.

We are so grateful for the guidance of the Holy Spirit during this remarkable process, and thankful for the generous donors and friends who have donated \$2,002,121 to the Living Stones Capital Campaign. Office Construction Updates

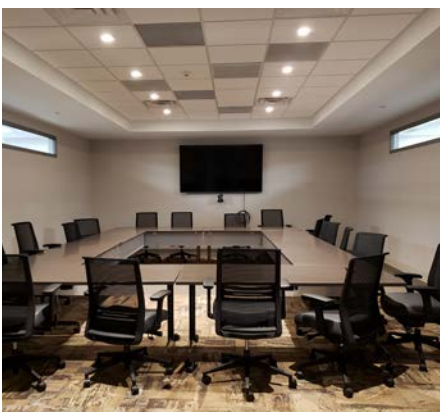
We moved into our new office on April 1st, and much continues to happen. One of the great blessings of our new office space is the ability to host meetings and gatherings. The cornerstone of our operation at IPF is relational—being with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. From that flows fellowship with all our participants, friends, and benefactors. Previously, our offices did not have meeting space or space for social gatherings. We were fortunate to use space at Creighton University or local Catholic parishes for various events.

Recently, we hosted a group of fourteen priests, seminary personnel, and IPF staff to assist in shaping our IPF National Symposium which will be held at Mundelein Seminary in March 2023. There was ample room for presentations in our new conference room, along with space to have lunch and dinner together in our reception area; and we were able to celebrate Mass in the space of our partially constructed chapel.

The chapel continues to take shape and will have a formal dedication once it is finished. We are working on getting an altar and some permanent chapel chairs with kneelers. For now we are using folding chairs. Still, it is a blessing to be able to celebrate daily Mass in our office with our staff and others who are visiting—whether for yearly board meetings or other events.

On a few occasions, we hosted a morning coffee in our reception area for local friends of IPF. Now that we are more centrally located in Omaha, it has been nice to meet new people in this part of town. We have been blessed by many supporters in this current phase of IPF's life with a new headquarters supported by the Living Stones campaign to make sure IPF is poised for the future, including hiring more full-time priests and staff. We hope to be able to pay down the building loan by year end and are grateful for all we have received.

We are looking forward to many years of fulfilling our mission of serving seminarians and priests across the country and using our new headquarters as the place of preparation for that mission.





From Sea to Shining Sea: Serving Diocesan Priests Nationwide

After the IPF summer programs conclude, the IPF calendar takes the staff to many places as they continue to serve the spiritual lives of diocesan priests. In addition to the regular travel for IPF's programs for priests—the two sections of the Spiritual Direction Training Program in Mundelein, Illinois, alumni retreats in Clearwater, Florida, a retreat for vocation directors in Lutz, Florida, and others—IPF staff have and will visit several locations throughout the United States to offer their services to diocesan priests during the rest of 2022.

In early September, IPF staff members were present at the National Conference of Diocesan Vocation Directors (NCDVD) Convention, which took place in Baltimore, Maryland. At the conference, Fr. Jim Rafferty presented a workshop on discernment in vocation ministry. Fr. Brian Welter, Kathy Kanavy, Mary Buttell, and Tina Targy were also present to inform the vocation directors about IPF's offerings for them and their seminarians. IPF is grateful to support vocation directors in their ministry to discerners and seminarians.

After NCDVD, Fr. Rafferty served at a clergy retreat in Boise, Idaho. The theme for the retreat was encountering Christ in the midst of active priestly ministry. It addressed the desire of priests who wanted to be aware of their relationship with the Lord even as they are caring for their parishioners.

In December, Fr. Welter and Fr. Rafferty will present a clergy conference to the priests of Honolulu, Hawaii, on spiritual direction. The conference will focus on the dynamics of relational prayer and discernment, not only in one's own life but also in accompanying others.

IPF will be busy throughout the fall and early winter, traveling from the East Coast to the islands of Hawaii in the Pacific Ocean. Praise God that IPF has been granted the privilege of being able to serve priests throughout the United States as they minister to their people.

Advent Reflection Opportunities

As the liturgical season of Advent approaches, IPF has planned two different opportunities that will give individuals a chance to pray, reflect, and prepare their hearts for the Lord.

First, IPF will host an Advent Morning of Reflection in Omaha at Christ the King Parish on Saturday, December 10th. The event will begin with Mass at 8:15 a.m. and go until noon. It includes a time for silent reflection, prayer, and guided meditations from IPF staff. Mark your calendars and join us as we take this time to ponder the Word of God in preparation for Christmas.

The second opportunity presented by IPF is a 20-minute reflection given by Fr. Dennis Spies, Diocese of Joliet. Fr. Spies is an adjunct IPF faculty member who assists in multiple IPF programs. This will be made available on the IPF website at the beginning of the Advent season. We encourage everyone to take some time and watch this Advent reflection.

Whether it marks the beginning of your Advent season or is a quiet gift for your spiritual life right before Christmas Eve, our hope is that Fr. Spies's reflection will provide you with spiritual nourishment and grace as we ready our hearts for Jesus's arrival this Christmas. God bless!

Growing in Relationship with the Lord at IPF's Summer Program

Life at IPF was special. I had the opportunity to participate in the seminarian summer program this past summer, living in Omaha for nine weeks — partaking in prayer, fraternity, enriching classes, and time reflecting how the Lord was working in my life.

One particular grace, that started at the beginning of the summer and has continued to bear much fruit, is the realization that I do not initiate my relationship with God. This shift occurred toward the beginning of the program. While I was on silent retreat, the Lord gently invited me into this new type of seeing and living — that He is the one who initiates the relationship.

This was a radical shift from thinking that I need to get myself to a certain point before I can talk to God. It

has always been easy for me in the past to think that everything in my life depends on me: how successful I am, understanding what is going on, feeling capable of handling whatever life throws at me. The thought was that once I got to a certain place, then I could pray, receive God's help, and be loved.

This summer, though, the Lord showed me that I do not need to be anywhere, but instead, the Lord is present to me no matter where I am. In short, problems in my life in no way blocked God from loving me! What a radical shift.

Instead of having to achieve sonship, I can receive sonship. Instead of having to figure out what God wants, I can trust in His timing. Instead of controlling sin, I can let Christ conquer sin for me. This type of new entrance into life was truly a gift from the Lord, and I am grateful for how IPF opened the way for a renewed receiving of God's work.

IPF to Sponsor a National Symposium on the Propaedeutic Year in March 2023



IPF staff and a group of seminary personnel from around the United States recently met to finalize plans for a symposium to be held March 16-19, 2023. The symposium, which will be held at the Conference Center of Mundelein Seminary, will focus on the Propaedeutic Stage of formation. Although this stage of priestly formation has been underway throughout the Catholic world for some time, it is a relatively new feature for most dioceses and seminaries in the United States.

This stage, mandated by the 2016 document from Rome, *The Gift of the Priesthood*, and further developed by the U.S. document the *Program for Priestly Formation*, serves as the first part of the journey of priestly formation. It emphasizes particularly the human and spiritual preparation of a candidate for the priesthood, so that the subsequent stages of formation can be more effective.

Several dioceses and seminaries across the United States have already launched such programs, and others are preparing to do so.

The symposium will gather those involved with priestly formation to engage in conversation about how best to implement the Propaedeutic Stage in keeping with the vision of the two documents mentioned above. The gathering will feature times of prayer, large group presentations, as well as gatherings of smaller groups for times of discussion and reflection.

Theology as Prayer A Primer for the Diocesan Priest

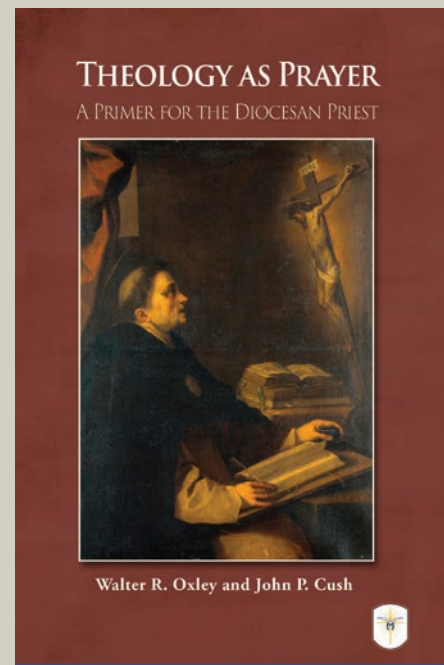
