Deacon James Keating Joins Institute Faculty

The Institute for Priestly Formation welcomed Deacon James Keating as its newest staff member on July 1, 2006. Deacon Keating comes to IPF following thirteen years as associate professor of moral and spiritual theology at the Pontifical College Josephinum, a seminary for training diocesan priests located in Columbus, Ohio.

His role in the Institute will be to develop programs of spiritual growth for seminary faculty and staff members, helping to fulfill the vision of the Institute's fourth symposium which asked the question, "How can spiritual formation be more at the heart of priestly formation?"

Keating will do research and writing on these and other related topics, as well as work with seminarians directly to assist them in discovering ways to receive the study of theology in a more contemplative manner.

Ordained a deacon in 2001, Deacon Keating identifies his calling to the diaconate as the vehicle that helped him hear the Lord's call to accept this position at the Institute.

"I began to see that my call to the diaconate included a more specific invitation to directly assist seminarians and priests in their formation and ministry while at the same time ministering to the laity in such a way that assists them to receive the gifts carried by the priest," Keating said.



The Rev. Mr. James Keating joined the Institute faculty this past July. He will be responsible for developing programs of sprittual growth for seminary faculty and staff.

"In so doing the lay person is enabled to live his or her call to transform culture. The diaconate became for me a real envoy position, situating me between whatever theological skills I can offer the priest and whatever encouragement I can give to the laity to draw their strength from the mysteries of the altar."

Keating was born in Yonkers, N.Y., and studied at Siena College in Albany, N.Y., and Fordham University in New York City. He earned his Ph.D. in Systematic Theology from Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, Pa. He and his wife, Marianne, are the parents of four children Kristoffer, 18 (a freshman at Creighton University); Jonathan, 16; Liam, 7; and Ina Mairead, 5. They are parishioners at St. Margaret Mary parish in Omaha, Neb.

Dear Friends,

A s autumn makes its way into Omaha, we think back on this past summer's programs with deep gratitude and look forward to the coming months with great expectation.

In May we welcomed 122 seminarians to the program of spiritual formation for diocesan seminarians—a record number. A generous and gifted group of nearly 80 faculty, staff and guest lecturers served these seminarians for the 10 week program. The seminar for seminary spiritual directors hosted 15 priests while the Spiritual Exercises program exceeded last year's numbers as 27 priests and seminarians prayed through the 30 days.

Looking to the future, as mentioned in the lead article, Dr. Keating's arrival means that IPF can now begin to offer more programs for seminary personnel. He is "on the road" these days offering a workshop to seminary theologians helping them appreciate the possibilities of a "contemplative" approach to teaching and studying. Plans call for the development of a retreat for seminary theologians to deepen the fruits of this workshop.

In the coming months, Fr. George Aschenbrenner, S.J., Fr. John Horn, S.J., and Kathy Kanavy will also be traveling to dioceses and

seminaries for a variety of programs, including programs assisting seminary spiritual directors. The spiritual direction training programs in Austin and Chicago continue as well.

These specific programs and numbers of participants all manifest what lies at the center of IPF's mission: the desire to draw priests and future priests in closer union with the Heart of Christ, the place from which all of diocesan priestly life must flow. We are grateful to the many individuals and groups who support the Institute in carrying out its mission. The intercessory prayer, the labors of love offered by many volunters and the generous financial sacrifices made by growing numbers of individuals help fuel the

fire that burns in the heart of the Institute's programs.

Also honored was Monsignor David Bohr, Academic Dean of the Pontifical North American College in Rome.

Msgr. Bohr is perhaps best known for his substantive contribution to the teaching of Catholic moral theology. He is the author of the widely used text "Catholic Moral Tradition: in Christ, a New Creation." His citation read in part: "His prayerful advice and generosity to IPF faculty and spiritual directors helped found, sustain and catalyze the mission of the Institute. Msgr. Bohr also provided three of the original six seminarians for IPF's opening summer at Creighton II years ago."

The awards were presented during a Mass at St. John's Church on the Creighton campus. The medallions were presented by the four Institute founders: Fr. George Aschenbrenner, S.J, Fr. Richard Gabuzda, Fr. John Horn, S.J., and Kathleen Kanavy.

Father Gabuzda Celebrates Ordination Anniversary

The Executive Director of the Institute for Priestly Formation (IPF), the Rev. Richard Gabuzda, S.T.D. recently celebrated the 25th Anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Father Gabuzda was ordained on September 27, 1981, in the Church of St. John Nepomucene, Freeland, Pa. (his home parish).

Following ordination, he served for three years as an assistant pastor at the Church of St. Boniface, Williamsport, Penn, before beginning doctoral studies at the Pontifical Athenaeum, Sant'Anselmo in Rome. He then served as a faculty member at St. Pius X Seminary in the Diocese of Scranton for eight years before the founding of the Institute.

Father Gabuzda returned to his home diocese for an anniversary Mass and reception on September 3, 2006. In addition to many family members and friends, 50 priests were in attendance at the celebration. The retired Bishop of Scranton, James C. Timlin, and the Auxiliary Bishop of Scranton, John C. Dougherty also joined in the celebration.

Father Gabuzda continued the celebration by presiding at an anniversary Mass at Christ the King Parish in Omaha, Neb., on September 17th joined by many Omaha Archdiocesan priests and religious. In his homily Father Gabuzda highlighted the gift of having been called to found the Institute, a direct result of a
