Dear Friends,

I spent a few days after Christmas visiting my parents who are retired in Colorado. Each afternoon, I went to their local parish and prayed in the adoration chapel. I would also walk over to the church and look at the art and devotional areas in the church. Sometimes, I was the only person in the chapel or church; other times, there were several other people. Some of them I noticed praying were likely retirees, and some may have been widows or widowers. I began to think of my own parents and their weekly devotion to pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament. I felt a great sense of gratitude welling up in me as I thought about how important churches are to the faithful, and particularly that there is a parish nearby where my parents can pray and go to Mass. I also had a deep sense of gratitude welling up in me for the pastor of the parish (whom I have met only once) and for the bishop of the diocese, that they offer up the toil of administration to care for these parishes.

With that same gratitude, I am glad that IPF will honor Fr. Dan Kampschneider, a retired priest from Omaha, Nebraska, with our second annual St. John Vianney Award for Priestly Service at our "IPF Presents: Hearts on Fire" dinner in April. As I thought about Fr. Kampschneider and the steadfastness and grace with which he lived as a pastor, I am also reminded of all the pastors of our parishes who strive to hand on the faith, create a space for prayer amidst a very secular culture, and go to great lengths to care for many facets of the parish that many of us would not notice. Finally, similar to the pastors who quietly go about caring for their parishes, please read about one of our many regular donors whose gifts have quietly cared for the needs of IPF over many years. We are profoundly grateful.



30 Years of Giving in Support of IPF's Mission

When the IPF Summer Program for Diocesan Seminarians began at Creighton University in the summer of 1995, I was also on the Creighton campus completing a graduate degree in Christian Spirituality. During that very first summer of IPF, I spoke several times to Fr. Gabuzda, who shared the vision of IPF with me. I also spoke with a few seminarians during that summer, and they shared their enthusiasm for being taught to pray more personally and how their personal relationship with the Lord was deepening. All this inspired me with hope and joy for these young men.

In 1995, I had already been ordained a priest for 35 years, and I knew from experience that the challenges of the diocesan priest could be effectively faced only by spending time in personal prayer with the Lord Jesus Christ. I knew then, during that initial summer, that I wanted to be part of the IPF community. The Holy Spirit stirred within me the desire to draw seminarians into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ - who was calling them to be His priests. I asked Fr. Gabuzda if I could possibly be part of the IPF experience in the future as a spiritual director for the 8-day silent directed retreat which draws the seminarians into a deep personal encounter with the Lord at the very beginning of the summer program. In the year 2000, my desires were fulfilled when I began



to be involved with the IPF Seminarian Program, and I have been active as an adjunct staff member in several other IPF programs since then.

However, being a pastor, I realized that the Lord's call to serve God's people also includes being a good steward. It is essential to good stewardship to share your financial resources to build the Body of Christ. I have given and continue to give a portion of my tithe to the IPF mission each month. Any gift given to further the mission of the Gospel returns sevenfold, and the Lord cannot be outdone in generosity. His call to me to be part of the IPF community began when I was forty years a priest and sixty-seven years old. What a blessing God has bestowed upon me to grow old serving young men, both seminarians and priests, who are keeping me young at heart at ninety years of age! What a blessing to have formed deep friendships from among the community of IPF Staff—those who serve full time and as adjuncts.

Jesus said, "I have come that you may have life, and have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). I thank the Lord, for I have experienced His abundant life in and through the IPF community over the past twenty-five years. What a joy for me to share with you this "good news" of His gift to me.

New Cohort of the IPF Spiritual Direction Training Program

The IPF staff will soon welcome approximately one hundred and fifty priests into a new cohort of its Spiritual Direction Training Program held at the University of St. Mary of the Lake/ Mundelein Seminary Conference Center in Illinois. The two sections of priests will begin in Spring 2024 and conclude in Winter 2027, meeting one week each spring, fall, and winter for the next three years.

The priest participants come from sixty-nine different dioceses across all regions of the United States including: Omaha, Lincoln, Denver, Chicago, Joliet, Green Bay, Austin, San Angelo, St Paul-Minneapolis, New York, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Orlando, St. Petersburg, Winona-Rochester, Phoenix, Orange, and San Bernadino, to name a few.

Those beyond the US come from the Latin Patriarch Seminary in Beit Jala, Israel, the United Kingdom, Belize, and Canada.

The program will help the priests to strengthen their own personal relationship with God as well as their priestly identity. Teaching, seminar conversations, priestly fraternity, and practicum experiences will assist them to serve others with keener gifts of spiritual discernment for spiritual direction and throughout their priestly ministry.

One recent alumnus said, "The spiritual direction training program not only equipped me to be a more confident and Christ-centered director but has helped to revitalize my priesthood by grounding me in the love of the Trinity."

The IPF Spiritual Direction Training Program is co-sponsored by the Archdiocese of Denver, the Archdiocese of Omaha, and the University of St Mary of the Lake.

Why is a Foundation Important to a Non-Profit Corporation?


The third article in the series on the IPF Foundation that will provide information regarding the IPF Foundation funds and explain why a thriving Foundation is essential.

To recap, the focus of this series in the *Hearts* on *Fire* magazine is to define the purpose of the IPF Foundation Corporation. It is "exclusively to support and benefit the Institute for Priestly Formation . . . and it adopts IPF's Mission Statement as its own." The IPF Foundation provides donors with additional ways to give in a manner that reflects the donors' giving preferences.

Represented by the photos above, the purpose-restricted funds in the IPF Foundation support many IPF programs. Donations made to these funds provide for specific programs' needs. IPF can request money from the funds via grants to provide additional funding for specific programs as needed. In past issues, we highlighted the Blessed Stanley Rother Pre-Ordination Retreat Fund for seminarians and the Nazareth House Fund, which supports the upkeep of the house for the IPF Priests of St. Joseph. The third fund in this series is the St. Charles Borromeo Spiritual Program for Bishops Fund. This fund was established by the Rev. James Schwertley Estate to provide for the Spiritual Formation Program for Bishops, covered in detail on pg. 9.



About the IPF Bishop's Program

This February, we concluded our inaugural three-year spiritual program for bishops. Our initial cohort of ten bishops met for two weeks each year, for the past three years. All of us are left with deep gratitude that this program has impacted our ten bishops and also affects all the faithful members of each bishop's diocese. Our desire, three years ago, was to bring IPF's long history of providing spiritual direction, silent retreats, and education in the spiritual life to the life and ministry of bishops in a more intentional way. This inaugural program for bishops focused on the spiritual life as the heart of the bishop's ministry to help him shepherd from the depth of his communion with God.

We also desired that the bishops find deepening communion with the Lord, develop ways to find balance in the midst of their busy mission, experience deeper joy in their ministry, amplify their courage to be with Jesus at the crosses that have come and will come, and cultivate a deeper fraternity and spiritual friendship among themselves. From the sharing of graces as we listened to the bishops at the end of this program, we have certainly met these desires and more.

We have a dedicated fund in our IPF Foundation to support this very important new program for bishops. It is the St. Charles Borromeo Spiritual Program for Bishops Fund, as St. Charles is the patron saint of bishops.

Pre-Ordination Retreat



IPF provided a pre-ordination retreat for sixteen men preparing to be ordained priests or deacons at the Loyola on the Potomac Retreat Center in Faulkner, Maryland, from December 28 to January 6. The men entered into silent prayer with the Lord each day for four distinct holy hours. They also gathered for Mass. Each day, the group observed retreat silence, with no conversation, no outside communication, and no access to digital media, to help the men be entirely present to the Lord.

Fr. Jim Rafferty, Fr. Josh Brown, and Fr. Innocent Montgomery, CFR, served as spiritual directors, meeting with retreatants individually each day to accompany them in their prayer. The participants received beautiful personal encounters with the Lord. One collective grace that they shared was the blessing of praying alongside each other in silence throughout the week. They felt personally connected to one another even though they did not know each other before the retreat, and they were not conversing during the days. Being united in prayer drew them together into deeper fraternity.

Lenten Reflections from IPF



On March 2nd, IPF held its annual Lenten Morning of Reflection. The title of the morning's reflection was, "We Would Like to See Jesus," and it was led by Fr. Brian Welter. The event began with 8:15 a.m. Mass at Christ the King. After Mass, those attending were invited to enjoy a light breakfast and social time. Following a few brief announcements, Fr. Brian offered his reflection on Palm Sunday and verses 20-21 from John, chapter 12. At the conclusion of the presentation, time was set aside for personal prayer and silent reflection. The morning finished as attendees shared the graces they had received from the event.

Fr. Josh Brown, an IPF Priest of St. Joseph, recorded a Lenten reflection entitled, "At the Foot of the Cross." Propaedeutic Year Symposium Webinar


As a follow-up to IPF's March 2023 Symposium on the Propaedeutic Year, IPF hosted an online webinar on March 14, 2024.

The original symposium gathered over one hundred participants at the Conference Center of Mundelein Seminary. Participants and speakers came from a variety of dioceses and seminaries. The program featured a combination of keynote speakers, panel presentations, and small-group discussions.

The symposium focused on the still-new addition to priestly formation known as the Propaedeutic Year. The Propaedeutic Year precedes the scholarly and philosophical study of seminary and focuses on prayer and preparation. Although this year has been in place in many countries throughout the world for some time, it has been less prevalent in the United States. The purpose of this year, which is to be the first year of the formation process, is to help new candidates develop spiritually and humanly so that subsequent periods of formation can be more fruitful.

The Symposium webinar was open to those directly involved in the Propaedeutic Year, but it was also available to all seminary formators and vocation directors. It featured brief presentations by three panelists followed by an open conversation with participants. The panel members were: Fr. John Floeder, St. Paul Seminary (Archdiocese of St. Paul); Fr. Paul Hoesing, Kenrick-Glennon Seminary (Archdiocese of St. Louis); and Fr. Brady Wagner, St John Vianney Seminary (Archdiocese of Denver).

The discussion, moderated by Fr. Brian Welter, focused on two questions: How are the men who participate in the Propaedeutic Year responding to the experience? What are we, as formators, learning from these initial years?
