From the IPF Executive Director:

Dear Friends,

As you read this, we will be immersed in our IPF Summer Program hosted at Creighton University. We welcome 125 seminarians for a nine-week program to help deepen their spiritual lives. We also have 10 priests and seminarians making the 30-Day Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola, and we will also be holding a three-week seminar for seminary spiritual directors. The summer is enlivened by many people participating in the programs and with adjunct IPF faculty and life-long friends of IPF coming and going during the nine weeks. Being immersed in prayer, daily Mass, and friendship during the summer and witnessing the transformation that God brings about in the seminarians and priests (including our IPF faculty and staff!) is uplifting.

Prior to the summer program, we have been on the road hosting our Spiritual Direction Training Program on the campus of University of St. Mary of the Lake/ Mundelein Seminary in Illinois (we make six trips for this program each year where 150 priests from across the country participate). We also offered our yearly IPF alumni retreats, and retreats for seminarians who are on the cusp of ordination (either to the diaconate or priesthood). We host these at retreat centers in Florida and Texas. Finally, in Omaha, we hosted our boards of advisors for our bi-annual meetings. IPF is blessed to have a board of advisors for our non-profit entity (IPF) and a board of advisors for the IPF Foundation. You will read more about them in this issue.

Finally, we moved off-campus into our new offices at 11626 Nicholas Street in April. Our staff, and many friends, helped make the move successful. Our Omaha headquarters is the physical place from which we are sent into the "mission field" of accompanying priests and seminarians (whether at Creighton, Illinois, Florida, Texas, and other locations). It is also the place to which we return after the "mission" to share the fruit (in person or through this magazine) of what the Lord brought forth while on mission. It reminds me of the Acts of Apostles—they were sent out by the Church to proclaim the word of God and returned home to share what the Lord accomplished. The Lord has accomplished much this year, and we are grateful.

From the IPF Foundation President



What a whirlwind the past six months have been at the Institute for Priestly Formation and the IPF Foundation. We worked together with our Corporate Board, Foundation Board, Finance Committee, many wonderful volunteers and donors to secure the perfect building to be the new headquarters for IPF in

Omaha, Nebraska. IPF has become a national organization with several programs over the years, serving 156 U.S. Dioceses, and 55 International Dioceses. In Omaha alone, we have served over 3,000 seminarians on the campus of Creighton University. Besides Omaha, programs take place in three additional locations: Mundelein, Illinois; Corpus Christi, Texas; and Clearwater, Florida.

As we once again welcome seminarians this summer to Omaha, I reflect on being invited to attend the eight-day retreat with the seminarians last summer. I have never experienced anything like the deep love God shared with me and how He wanted me to reciprocate that love with Him. For the first time in my life, I understood with clarity the power and gifts the Holy Spirit gives to me. While attending evening seminars, spending time in personal prayer, and making a daily visit with a spiritual director, I discovered God's love. I felt a deep loving relationship with the Holy Trinity and discovered a power of prayer I have never known.

This past year, I was invited to observe another IPF program first-hand, the Spiritual Direction Training Program. I attended alongside priests and bishops who were participating in the second session of their three-week training program for this year. Once again, it was a powerful experience. I witnessed faculty accompanying priests and bishops in their ongoing spiritual formation and saw how the training would allow participants to lead others to Christ in their parishes and schools. It was fascinating observing the interaction, camaraderie, and friendships among the priests from across the country as they renewed their priesthood through prayer and spiritual direction. It was powerful to learn and again experience the power of deep prayer from these dedicated priests in their journey to become spiritual directors.

Yes, we have accomplished a great deal since our last magazine. We purchased a new building, are renovating the structure to meet our needs, launched the Living Stones Building Campaign to pay for the building and renovations, and moved into the new IPF offices. The Living Stones Building Campaign is not finished. There is more to be done. Please go to page 6 to see more information on our progress and how you can help. We are blessed by all the support we have received from so many this year.

Joy of Giving Update

On Wednesday, May 18th, the Institute for Priestly Formation joined parishes and other Catholic non-profits in the Omaha area to celebrate "Joy of Giving," a fundraising day hosted by the Archdiocese of Omaha.

As the twenty-four hours of giving commenced, visitors to IPF's "Joy of Giving" page were invited to learn more about IPF by watching a short "What is IPF?" video. They could also read about current events and updates, with several links pointing them to our latest magazine and recent virtual event videos.

By midday, just over \$2,500 had been gifted in support of IPF's mission. In the late afternoon, a donation made to IPF qualified for one of the booster prizes offered by the Archdiocese, gifting an additional \$50 to our total. As the day of giving wound to a close at midnight, 45 donors had offered their support to IPF with a total of \$4,205.

Due to the generosity of donors, IPF not only maintained, but also finished with a position in the top 25 leaderboard. The bountiful offerings of money and prayer showcased the support that the Omaha community has for the mission of IPF, and we are deeply grateful.

IPF Presents: Forming Priests to Help Others in Prayer

IPF's latest virtual event premiered on May 5, 2022. The program introduced viewers to one of our two largest formation programs, the Spiritual Direction Training Program. Over 500 priests have participated in this program since its inception and about 150 priests are enrolled in the current round.

The content of the virtual event focuses on helping viewers peer into the inner workings of the program. For many people, the term "spiritual direction" may be somewhat foreign or puzzling. It may be even more challenging to imagine how someone might be trained to offer such direction. The program's host, Father Andy Roza, a program alumnus from the Archdiocese of Omaha, offers insights into the program's various dimensions while testimonials from other alumni, including Archbishop Samuel Aquila of Denver, fill out the picture.

A significant and central topic of the training program includes learning about the Rules for the Discernment of Spirits. These Rules, composed by St. Ignatius of Loyola, S.J., help answer the question: "When I pray, how can I tell what is from God and what is not?" Priest testimonials also reveal the importance of the silent retreat that participants experience during each of the three years of the program.

The event concludes with an invitation from IPF's Foundation President, Mary Buttell, for viewers to help keep tuition costs reasonable for our program participants. Those who missed the premiere can access the video of the virtual event by going to IPF's website, www.priestlyformation.org.

Campaign Accomplishments

We are **two-thirds** of the way to completing the Living Stones Building Campaign. Approximately \$1,500,000 is still needed. By paying off the cost of the five-year building loan. Staying Connected: Checking for IPF Emails in Your Inbox

One of the questions that the IPF office often receives is, "Why haven't I seen any emails from IPF lately?"

For events, donation requests, and announcements to large groups, IPF uses a program for sending emails called "Constant Contact." Constant Contact allows IPF to send emails to hundreds or thousands of our supporters and alumni.

However, for some people, particularly those who use Gmail, the emails get redirected. Rather than landing in the inbox, they often end up in a "promotions" folder, which the recipient may or may not be aware exists. A brief search for email from ipf@creighton.edu should help locate emails from IPF.

Alternatively, sometimes a person will unsubscribe from IPF emails via Constant Contact. For example, if an email about an upcoming IPF event is not of interest, the recipient might hit 'unsubscribe' at the bottom of the email. This will opt the person out of receiving all future IPF emails to large groups, including upcoming events, announcements, or fundraising opportunities. The individual will need to contact our office in order to resubscribe and be added back on to the email lists. Emails keep us connected. Consider checking to make sure you're aware of the latest details coming from IPF.

IPF to Host National Symposium on the Propaedeutic Stage of Formation

Plans are underway for IPF to host a national symposium for seminary and vocation personnel. The gathering will take place on the campus of Mundelein Seminary in suburban Chicago, March 16-19, 2023.

The focus of the symposium will be a new and important part of the process of priestly formation known as the Propaedeutic Stage. Outlined in a landmark document from the Vatican published in 2016, the stage provides a kind of pre-seminary experience for those already accepted as candidates.

The purpose of the symposium is to gather those involved in such programs for a time of prayer, encouragement, exchange of ideas, and conversation on the challenges and successes of programs already in existence.

In preparation for the symposium, IPF hosted a consultation of some vocation and seminary personnel in March 2022 and will host a second conversation in September. The sessions serve as a platform for planning the March 2023 symposium.
